OAR NORTHWEST HEADS BACK TO THE OPEN SEA

<u>Daring Local Ocean Crossers' First Major Training Row</u>

Seattle, WA - They eventually plan to set a world record. But first they had to find out if they could make it through one night together.

The four men of OAR Northwest attempted their first of three major training rows as they aim for the 2011 Mid-Atlantic Rowing Race. The crew is raising funds in support of Right to Play, International.

They shoved off from La Push, Washington Tuesday, June 22 for three nights on the Pacific Ocean. They rowed back into Grays Harbor at around 1pm Friday, June 25. Jordan Hanssen, Captain of the crew called the trip "one heck of a suffer-fest" that included worse than expected sea sickness and unseasonable ocean conditions.

Atlantic Ocean Rowing Race veteran Greg Spooner calls the trip "an initial shake-down cruise" intended to break in the two new crew members and reacclimate the two veterans. Spooner and Jordan Hanssen were half of the first team to ever row unassisted across the Atlantic from mainland U.S. to mainland U.K. They were joined in their 29-foot rowboat by Olympic Gold Medalist Adam Kreek and former UW rower Richard Tarbill.

The three-day trip was intended to build team unity while under stress in a tight space. While Kreek and Tarbill have spent countless hours rowing, this was their first experience in the open ocean aboard OAR Northwest's rowboat. They didn't see land for much of the journey and rowed through one night. Another night, the crew slept through the night on the sea anchor to simulate stormy conditions.

This first outing was also the first trial run for menu planning, with pre-packed meals providing 6500 calories daily.

After this three-day training session, the second will be a tour of the greater Puget Sound and San Juan Islands/Strait of Juan de Fuca. The third will be a two to three week expedition from Vancouver, BC to San Francisco, CA.
